scrub with a damp sponge. Rinse with hot water.
You can also use lemon bergamot mint, lavender
mint, or any other strongly scented mint.

SAGW 2019 Preview

he Sheboygan County Area Garden Walk Selection Committee has been very busy visiting and selecting gardens for next year's annual Walk. 2019's Walk will feature eight fantastic gardens in the City of Sheboygan with four on the south and four on the north side.

What is unique about next year's Walk is that four of the gardens will offer and provide valuable educational opportunities not just for the adults attending but for the children as well. The SAGW Committee is focused on making next year's Walk just that while also including the "classical" floral gardens.

Starting with Dan & Julie's City Sweet Garden, "the urban city growers" have shown how you can grow an abundance of vegetables and fruits all on a very small city street corner. Dan has shown practicality and creativity while remaining chemically free. He also is a member of the Sheboygan County Beekeepers Association and will be providing those visiting his garden next year with the opportunity to purchase his honey along with sharing information on bee keeping.

Julie will be on hand to display her butterfly cage as well as share the process of the chrysalis's transformation through metamorphosis. They recently added 30 new plantings to further encourage the butterflies to visit their garden.

The City Sweet Garden also provides a wonderful opportunity for children to see & learn about the different innovative ways of gardening, particularly sustainability.

Children younger than twelve (12) years of age will be admitted free to future walks under adult supervision. We as MGV's know how valuable it is to plant that "seed" in young impressionable minds and the sooner the better. We need to foster and encourage our future growers.



Also scheduled on next year's Walk is Ray Rogers who recently headed the Horticulture Department at LTC. Ray has recently retired and has just installed a pristine greenhouse which houses many of his unique plants surrounded by his overflowing garden of native plants.

A must see is Joe & Brent's city garden which we coin as the "cat's meow". You are greeted with a beautifully done front yard filled to the brim with unusual and unique plantings including shrubs and trees as well as Two Fish Gallery artwork displayed for your enjoyment. Wander back to their patio area (it's a tropical paradise) that they have filled with incredible plants which they have wintered over for many years with tender loving care. Learn how Joe & Brent have accomplished this and then gander over to view Sheboygan's oldest standing tree in their neighbor's back yard.

We have also included a drive-by garden, but if you have children along you would want to stop and let the children explore the artistic works of Carla Jensen's menagerie of jungle animals up close. Located at the Jensen's home will also be Bob's Wooden Bowls. Each piece is one of a kind made from a variety of exotic woods.

Added as a bonus is a spectacular lakeside garden, owners Robert and Kathie Norman will be showcasing their garden which flows into their backyard oasis of sweeping gardens that continues to the beachfront. Breathtaking beauty awaits you here.

The remainder of the other gardens are the "frosting on the cake" which all contains the elements of visual beauty in impeccably groomed gardens where placements of specimens are done in a very aesthetically pleasing manner.

The Epic Gardens are Epic

he American Conifer Society held its 2018 conference in Madison, Wisconsin this July. In addition to visiting several private gardens and the Longnecker Arboretum Pinetum, we had the opportunity to tour Epic Systems campus with Jeff Epping as our guide. Jeff is Director of Horticulture of Olbrich Botanic Gardens and is owner of Epping Design and Consultants. He is lead landscape designer for the Epic Systems site.

Epic Systems specializes in health information technology. Owner and CEO, Judy Faulkner, founded the company in 1979 and is listed now by Forbes as one of the 400 richest people. Jeff explained that she loves gardening and is environmentally sensitive and wanted to provide a unique environment for her employees. These beliefs were the basis of planning and construction of her new campus.

Epic Systems site is a very unique property and is difficult to describe. Some liken it to Disneyland. includes many buildings The site housing approximately 10,000 employees. The buildings are divided into 5 campuses each with a theme. They include: The Farm, Astronomy, Fantasy, and Western with a 5th under construction. grouping of building is planted to match the theme of Needless to say, it has given Jeff the group. Epping an opportunity to explore creative plantings that would not be normal for a corporate campus.

Since Judy is very environmentally conscious, all parking is underground. These underground structures are all planted with as little as 6-8 inches of soil on top of the 4 story parking garages. To avoid a flat look, Jeff has been innovative in sculpting these areas by layering Styrofoam sheets to give undulations with very little weight.

During our tour Jeff explained the process of developing the campuses. Initially, Judy is presented with 5 story boards. After much discussion she picks 3. The ideas go back to the architects and designers before a final selection is made. Jeff handles plant selection. The resulting landscape designs are amazing and very creative with very unique plants, waterfalls, prairies, desert settings and more.

A few pictures have been included to provide a sampling of the site landscaping at various campuses.

The visit was amazing and way too short to take in all the variety of the site.
