Member Focus

hristina Wilke-Burbach, Sheboygan Master Gardener member and president is launching a podcast she has titled, *Garden Goth*, which will be part of the new Community Radio Station at Mead Public Library. Her podcast will begin in early March.

"The mission of my podcast is to attract and engage younger, and more diverse gardeners in Sheboygan County while educating others on a plethora of gardening and horticulture concepts," said Christina. As a psychologist who specializes in alternative medicine and spirituality, she will also feature these topics in her podcast.

Her podcast, *Garden Goth* focusses on the duality of life and death. "Nothing illustrates the cycle of life and death better than plants, the four seasons, and the circle of the sun. Things sprout and begin to grow and are reborn (spring). They fire up or ignite or bloom (summer) and reach completeness (late summer). They begin to dry and wither and die (autumn). They rest (winter). Then they are reborn again in spring. These seasons - or "phases" "elements" or include an inherent understanding that the cycle continues endlessly, with each period of rest or winter followed by new growth, or spring. This cycle of life and death is perpetual in nature."

Garden Goth is inspired by the Gothic Movement, which is seeped deep in the Victorian era (late 1800s/early 1900) and its attempt to cope with frequent death and loss and the subsequent powerful emotions. "One of the ways Victorians coped with life and death was by creating and maintaining elaborate, dramatic gardens. In modern times, our recent pandemic has once again made people question their mortality and the way they live their life." Studies have shown that interest in gardening has risen in the past few years due to the pandemic. "People are spending more time at home, have more free time, and want to become more self-sufficient and sustainable."

Garden Goth is a 3-segment podcast.

Segment 1 (Memento Vivere) focuses on living a big and bold life to the fullest.

Segment 2 (Memento Mori) explores the darker and less understood side of life through gothic gardening, gothic philosophy, gothic literature, gothic music and other taboo and stigmatized things people might fear, due to lack of exposure to, and misunderstanding of these concepts. "The macabre, morbid, mysterious, supernatural, wonderful, and terrorizing. Things that are beyond what is immediately in front of us."

Segment 3 focuses on gardening, horticulture, sustainability, and land conservation.

"When released, the podcast will be available at Mead Community Radio | Mead Public Library (meadpl.org)."

In addition, to correlate with Mead Public Library's Winter Green Event, Christina will offer two free gardening classes; "Currently, I will offer two classes, Gardening 101 and Gardening 102."

She hopes to "grow" her garden classes by providing a monthly class throughout the year. "Some of my future classes will include a Gothic Gardening Class (Victorian Gardens), Fairy Mini Gardens, Indoor Gardening, Autumn Gardening, and Winter Gardening.

Prep Your Containers, by Daryl Beyers Garden Gate, Jan/Feb 2022

Early spring is the perfect time to get a jump on planting your containers. Pull them out of storage, scrub and sanitize them (if you didn't get it done in fall) and fill them to the brim with fresh fluffy potting mix. And a few scoops of fertilizer and set them outside. Spring rains will dampen and settle the mix leaving the perfect amount of space for the root balls of your transplants.

[Space-saving] Vegetables: Choose Your Crops Wisely, by Nikki Jabbour

Garden Gate, Jan/Feb 2022

In a small garden you need to make the most of the space you have and that starts with choosing crops and varieties suited for small spaces. While browsing through seed catalogs look for varieties described as "bush," "dwarf," and "patio."

What soil should I use in raised beds for blueberries?

Garden Gate, Mar/Apr 2022

To grow blueberries in almost any soil, incorporate peat moss into the planting medium. For raised

beds add bark (not cedar or redwood), compost topsoil. For inground plants dig a hole 2 1/2 wide and 1 foot deep and mix half the soil with an egual amount of moistened peat moss to backfill the planting hole.



Thwart all thorns.

Garden Gate, Mar/Apr 2021

When you are prunin thorny shrubs such as roses, barberry, or yucca or pulling weeds like thistle or stinging nettle, sometimes even sturdy gloves aren't enough protection. Hold a folded newspaper in your hand as extra protection and finish the job unscratched.

Watch roots grow.

Garden Gate, April 2020

Instead of growing seeds in black plastic trays, peat pots and other opaque items, use clear plastic cups. Recycle clear fast-food cups as seed starters and you will be able to see the roots develop, making it easier to see when seedlings have healthy roots and are ready for planting.

Access the <u>2022 Onboarding Lite in our Canvas Classroom</u> (netID required).

 Welcoming back past volunteers into the State MG program.

If you had dropped out of the State MG program within the last 5 years, there is an easy entry back into the state organization. We would like to have everybody consider rejoining.

If you would like to re-enter the MG program email wimastergardener@extension.wisc.edu or call 608-265-4536 and request to be reinstated. The program office will determine eligibility. You will need to officially reenter the MG state program in order to complete the MG on-boarding training.

• Entering hours into the ORS is a separate process.

You must complete the MG on-boarding course before you will be able to enter any hours into ORS.

Use your UW-Madison netID to log into Canvas.

This netID is a special, UW-Madison issued username. You must use your NetID username plus a password to get into Canvas.

It is different than your Online Reporting System (ORS) username and password.

Make sure you save your **Madison netID** for future use in the Canvas platform for virtual educational opportunities.
