Our mystery plant, *Craven Brake Fern*, was once again graciously donated by Steve Nowicki of Moraine Gardens and is always a great attraction; Karen Billman of Sheboygan Falls won the plant.

The 25th Sheboygan Area Garden Walk was held on Saturday, July 9th. The weather was perfect for our garden visitors. We were happy to feature seven gardens for the tour and all of them were very different and charming. We were asked to keep the price the same as the previous year:

- Aster, various hybrids
- Tall sedums

Personal note: I have <u>'Hillside Sheffield Pink'</u> in my garden, and it was covered with pale peach blooms well into November last year...attracting mostly honeybees and bumble bees. If anyone would like a piece of it, contact me. It's easy to grow and easy to pull when it gets out of hand. In 2017, I put two small transplants in a 4 ft square raised bed. They grew profusely and by October 29, had filled the bed.

sters: Splash Color across Your Autumn Garden with these Perennial Beauties. Garden Gate, September/October 2022

There are several types of asters, and each type has its own personality, growing best in certain conditions, showing a unique habit, or blooming at a different time. Most blooms are purple, lavender, or white.

New York aster (*Symphyotrichum novi-belgii*) Needs regular moisture and humus-rich soil to produce many purple blooms from late simmer to early fall. Plants grow to 5 ft tall and may need staking.

Blue wood aster (*Symphyotrichum cordifolium***)** Native to woodland edges, it is happiest growing in part shade but can do well in full sun. The pale or deep blue flowers have yellow centers and are present from late summer to midfall. Needs regular moisture and 5 ft plants may flop without stakes.

Tatarian aster (Aster tataricus)

Plants have distinctive very long paddle-shaped leaves. Lots of lavender blossoms showing later than other asters and blooming until frost. A vigorous spreader, it grows six feet tall on sturdy, stiff stems that need no support.

New England aster (*Symphyotrichum novae-angliae*)

One of the most popular and early blooming asters with lots of varieties to choose from. Needs regular moisture and full sun. Pinch in early summer to prevent flopping. 'Alma Potschke' is deep pink/red.

Smooth aster (*Symphyotrichum laeve*) This late-blooming 2-4-foot plant is perfect for

meadows, naturalized plantings or borders that don't get a lot of water.

Aromatic aster (Symphyotrichum oblongifolium) The balsam fragrance of this aster is in its leaves, not its flowers. Lavender blooms appear on the 2-3 ft plants in late fall. It's tighter, mounded shape makes it perfect for the front of the border. It is drought tolerant and grows in a range of soils, including clay.
