4-H Youth Pledge to COMMUNICATE Effectively!

Dear 4-H Families,

The game's name for the next few months is Communication and the Arts. As leaders, members, parents, and staff... we all have responsibilities to communicate in one way or another. And when we are communicating, three very important elements of communication make it truly effective.

The first involves our HEAD; you have to know about something to talk about it. Don't get me wrong, I am familiar with plenty of people who know very little about any topic and still choose to discuss it at length. But in a world where credibility can take a long way, genuine knowledge or experience is vital.

Secondly, you have to have a HEART. Emotional investment, or what some call passion, only makes a speaker more credible and helps the listener engage in the words coming out of one's mouth. People who care about what they are talking about are better communicators than those who feel lukewarm about everything. This element gets to the heart of why leaders in the 4-H Program are the best.

In addition, we should always ask ourselves if our communication is HEALTHY. Are we communicating in a way that is emotionally safe for others? Are we choosing the right words, time, place, and audience to deliver our message to? It only does more harm than good when misusing these safety elements.

Finally, effective communicators will use their HANDS (and their bodies and faces) to communicate a message beyond words. Some call this walking the talk. They will teach and lead others not only by their words but also by their actions.

As you prepare for upcoming 4-H communication arts opportunities, whether it's a speech or demonstration or leading a club or project meeting, remember these three elements and ask yourself; am I using the four H's of effective communication? If not, where can I make the best better?

The Wisconsin 4-H Program is always evolving and we want to provide clear guidance to our leaders and members to ensure safety, and security and support your efforts with our young people. In an effort to do this, I'd like to feature an article where we take a closer look at the Wisconsin 4-H Policies each month. Check out the updates, reminders, and information here monthly!

Membership Dues and Participation Fees

4-H State Level Member Dues

Money collected from individuals for membership in the Wisconsin 4-H program. The amount of the dues and how the funds will be used are set by the Wisconsin 4-H Associate Director.

4-H County Level Member Dues*

Money collected from individuals for membership in the county 4-H program. The amount of the dues and how the funds will be used are set by the 4-H Program Educator.

*Please note that this policy would not prohibit a 4-H Leader Organization from requesting donations from 4-H members to support programming, marketing, and fundraising efforts.

4-H Club or Group Level Member Dues

Money collected from individuals for membership in the club or group. Dues are for the benefit of that specific club or group's membership. At the club or group level, members vote on the amount of dues and how all 4-H club or group funds are used.

Economic Hardship for Membership Dues

At the club, group, county, and state levels, the ability to pay dues will not be a barrier to 4-H membership. Staff and volunteers must have a system to provide access to 4-H membership.

Participation Fees

Money collected from individuals participating in a specific program or activity. Participation fees are charged directly to participants who choose to participate in the program or activity. These fees are separate from membership dues.

SCHOLARSHIPS

EASTERN WI DHIC SCHOLARSHIPS

Eastern WI DHIC will be offering two scholarships to eligible youth for the upcoming school year. A \$500 scholarship will be offered to a high school senior enrolling in a one-year Ag-related program (i.e. short course, technical school, etc.) A \$1000 scholarship will be awarded to a post-high school student currently enrolled in their first, second or third year of higher education in an Ag-related program. Applicant's <u>family does not have to be a member</u> of EWDHIC; however, applicants will need at least one recommendation from an EWDHIC member. Scholarship applications are available at the Eastern Wisconsin DHI Lab and on the web at: http://www.ewdhic.org/Scholarship.aspx They are due February 16, 2024



WISCONSIN 4-H FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP

The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will award more than \$20,000 in scholarships to outstanding Wisconsin 4-H members and alumni pursuing higher education in 2023. To be considered for financial support, applications will be accepted starting December 15, 2022,

and must be received by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation via email by Wednesday, March 13, 2024, at 5:00 pm.

Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships are awarded to students based on demonstrated personal growth through 4-H, development, and leadership in 4-H, academic performance, and future educational goals. To be eligible



for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships students must have been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least three years; should have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college or technical school during the 2023-2024 academic school year. Scholarship winners from previous years are not eligible to receive a second 4-H Foundation scholarship. The application is a one-page cover letter and

a one-page résumé, both of which give the 4-H youth a chance to share their 4-H achievements, as well as their future plans. Applicants are asked to treat this process as if applying for a job.

Cover letters and resumés must be submitted as one PDF document and emailed to scholarships@Wis4HFoundation.org. For complete instructions and detailed information about what to include in and how to prepare the application documents, 4-H youth can visit www.Wis4HFoundation.org/scholarships. A panel of experienced youth educators will screen the applications and select finalists. Applications chosen as finalists will be ranked by a second panel comprised of 4-H and youth development experts. The 4-H Foundation will assign available scholarships to the top-ranking applications based on scholarship criteria. Applicants who are awarded scholarships will be notified by postal letter and email in May.

SHEBOYGAN COUNTY 4-H ALUMNI ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIP

Eligibility for 4-H Alumni Scholarship: Due April 1

- a. Applicant must be a 4-H Alumni Member or currently a Sheboygan County 4-H Program member.
- b. Applicant must be graduated from high school at the time of applying for a scholarship and planning on attending a college or technical school, including a certificate and diploma program for the upcoming school year.
- c. Recipient will only be awarded one scholarship from the 4-H Alumni Association.
- d. Must be a 4-H member for a minimum of 5 years.

SHEBOYGAN COUNTY 4-H LEADERS ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIP

Description: One \$1000 scholarship will be awarded by the Sheboygan County 4-H Leaders Association, Inc. Four additional scholarships are available at \$500 each. Additional scholarships may be awarded based on the funds available.

Eligibility For 4-H Leaders Association Scholarship: Due April 1

- a. Applicants majoring in any professional technical, vocational, college or another training equivalent of at least one school year in length.
- b. All high school seniors or post-high school students currently in their first, second, or third year of higher education are eligible to apply.
- c. 4-H members are eligible to receive only one scholarship from the Sheboygan County 4-H Leaders Association.

About this time of year I am envious of all those animals that hibernate! Some days when the wind is blustering and the snow is falling I think it might be nice to fall asleep and wake up again when the daffodils are blooming. Do you know which Wisconsin mammals hibernate? Below is an excerpt from <u>http://dnr.wi.gov/org/caer/ce/eek/nature/snugsnow.htm</u> (Check out the link for the full story.)

"There are different kinds of hibernation. The "true" hibernators sleep so deeply that they are almost impossible to wake up. Woodchucks, ground squirrels and <u>bats</u> are "true" hibernators. A woodchuck's heart rate goes from 80 beats a minute when active to 4 or 5 beats a minute when in hibernation. Its body temperature drops from 98 degrees Fahrenheit to 38 degrees Fahrenheit. And, the woodchuck's incisors, which grow continuously and are kept short by all the gnawing it does, quit growing during hibernation. True hibernators do get up every few weeks to nibble on food, and in the case of the woodchuck, use an underground toilet room. When bats are ready to hibernate, they must find a place that stays above freezing. They gather together in caves called hibernacula." As humans, we can't hibernate so we might as well enjoy the winter. I hope you have been snow shoeing, skiing, skating, or finding other ways to take advantage of the cold weather. Oh, by the way, where is the camera when you need it?

Keep looking for critter clues. I love seeing tracks in fresh snow. Usually, my kids are faster than me at identifying them!

SHARE-A-KID APPLICATION INFORMATION

Each year, the Wisconsin Dairy Goat Association promotes interest in dairy goats in our state. One of the ways we encourage our young people in this aspect of agriculture is through our Share-a-Kid Program. We award an average of 4 to 6 dairy goat kids to young people across the state each year.

This is a competitive statewide contest. The youth applicant guidelines are:

- Write an essay of 100 words or more about why you would like to have a dairy goat.
- Some things to consider sharing:
- Have you ever raised a goat? (if not) Why do you want to raise a goat?
- How you are going to take care of her (food, shelter, and medical care).
- What do you love about goats?
- If you are new to raising goats, please include who your mentor would be.
- Can you tell us about the breed you would like to have?

This is a very competitive contest, and we want you to put effort into your essay. Spelling and content count. The essay can include drawings, photos, or anything special that you would like to include. Please keep a copy of your essay because no essays will be returned. If you are selected as a winner, your essay will be given to the donor. While we make every attempt to award winners one of their breeds of choice, if those breeds are not available, the Wisconsin Dairy Goat Association reserves the right to offer another breed to the winner. Share-a-Kid winners are not required to give a doe kid back to the program, but we encourage them to do so.

Rules:

- Youth must be between the ages of 10 and 17 by January of this year to enter.
- Entries are accepted January 1st until April 1st of this year.
- Entry form and all required signatures must accompany the essay.

- Youth must be a member of 4-H, FFA, WDGA, or other agricultural groups.
- Only 1 goat may be awarded per family per year, however, siblings are encouraged to enter.
- Youth may only win one time.
- Winners are required to show their goat at County Fair or in an open class goat show this Year or the following depending on when fair entries close.
- If under any circumstance the kid received through the program is to be sold or re-homed the individual or party who donated the kid will retain the first right of refusal.
- Youth who receive a kid must give updates to those who donated their kid at both 6 months and 12 months after the kid is received.
- A thank you of some sort (letter, card, etc.) should be given to the individual or party who donated your kid at the time of pick up

THE DEADLINE TO SUBMIT YOUR APPLICATION/ESSAY IS BY NO LATER THAN APRIL 1, 2024. All applicants will be notified of results by no later than May 1st, 2024. If you have any questions on this process, please contact Sharea-Kid Chair Andrew Puetz @ <u>ANDREW.PUETZ@GMAIL.COM</u>.

Exploring 4-H for New Families



Learn the Language

4-H uses terms that may be unfamiliar or used differently than what you've experienced in other places. Some of those words are explained here, but there may be some more terms you hear that aren't listed. Don't be afraid to ask your club leader if you're not sure what something means. The number next to each **bolded** word corresponds to the answer in the crossword puzzle on the opposite page.

4-H words you might hear in your Club

A 4-H club¹¹ is made up of youth members³ and caring adult volunteers who meet regularly. Clubs typically conduct business, serve the community, and have fun! Clubs can also be school-based, afterschool or have a project area focus. A Cloverbud¹¹ is a 4-H member in grades K-2. All clubs have at least one adult club leader¹⁰ who works with youth leaders to guide the group. 4-H clubs often do community service² projects to make a difference in their community. Some clubs also have their members track project progress throughout the year (and their 4-H career) through a record book¹. Clubs may also encourage members to give a demonstration⁶, where they teach a project-based skill to other members.







4-H words you might hear across your County

County 4-H programs offer opportunities for youth such as project days. camps, and more. For many 4-H members, one of the highlights of the year is showcasing their hard work at a local fair¹⁷. At the fair, members enter their project as an exhibit⁸. Many counties also have a Leaders Organization¹⁶ made up of adult volunteers and youth leaders. This group provides education, raises funds, and promotes 4-H throughout the county. The organization is usually known as a Leaders Federation, Leaders Association, or Leaders Council.

4-H words you might hear across Wisconsin

In 1914, the Smith-Lever Act established a partnership between the USDA and land-grant institutions. In 1890, it expanded to include historically black colleges and universities, and in 1994 added tribal colleges. This partnership is known as Cooperative Extension⁷. In Wisconsin, Extension is a division of UW-Madison and is home to the Wisconsin 4-H program. UW-Madison employs a county 4-H educator⁴ who leads and coordinates the county's 4-H program. Wisconsin 4-H uses the web platform, 4-H Online,⁹ to keep in touch with 4-H members. On this website, members can also enroll in an educational experience,¹⁹ which is an educational travel opportunity organized by the state 4-H office.



4-H words you might hear across the country

The 4 H's are Head⁵, Heart¹⁴, Hands¹⁵, and Health¹⁸. These are all part of the 4-H Pledge,¹² which is usually recited at the beginning of meetings. The 4-H Motto¹³, adopted nationally, is "To Make the Best Better."
